As part of this trainees conducted children's panchayats camp at various municipality like Vadanappally, Aloor, Chalakudy, Velukkara, Nattika and Padiyur.













Children's camp done at Vadanappally

As part of the fieldwork, trainees had conducted children's camp on 11/05/2023 to 12/05/2023 at Govt. Fisheries U P School Thrithallur for the adolescent group. The children's camp was inaugurated by Mrs.Shanthi Bhasi Vadanapally Gram panchayath President, program coordinated by welfare standing committee chairperson Mr. Sabith N. S and ICDS Supervisor Mrs.Vydehi K.R. The social work trainees conducted life skill education, public speaking, craft making and martial arts. The life skill education were given by Mr. Suresh (Faculty, DIST thrissur) and public speaking session was taken by Mr.Styju sir, craft session was taken by Mr. Athul sir. 30 students from different wards of Vadanapally

panchayath had participated in the camp.



Children's camp done at Aloor

As part of the fieldwork, trainees had conducted children's camp on 13th April 2023 from 10am to 1pm at Urumbunkunnu anganwadi of Aloor gram panchayath for children of age 10 to 15. The program was inaugurated by Mrs. Savitha Biju, member of 7th ward of Aloor and the presidential address was given by Mrs. Sheela, the teacher of Urumbunkunnu anganwadi and the trainees conduct different games and activities with the aim to motivate and encourage the children to achieve their goals, to understand the importance of team work, to make awareness about current scenario of social and personal problems. 26 children from Thaanipaara and Urumbunkunnu anganwadi had participated in the camp.



Children's camp done at Chalakudy

As part of the fieldwork, trainees had conducted children's camp on 20/05/2023 for adolescent group in the 36th ward of Chalakudy municipality (karunalayam). The childrens camp was inaugurated by Mrs.Bindhu Lonappan ICDS supervisor, Chalakudy municipality and the presidential address was given by Dr. Ajeesh George, assistant professor, Christ college (autonomous) Irinjalakuda. The social work trainees conducted skill training sessions, awareness classes, recreational activities and distribution of study materials for the students. The skill training session was done by the social work trainee Ms. Ninitha Thomas and the awareness classes was taken by Ms. Annmary K. A and Ms.Sneha Shaji. Accompanying this, a session of recreational activities was also conducted by the trainees Mr.Richard Babu and Mr.Robin T.J. 
Children's camp done at Padiyur




turn helped to boost up the self-esteem in children.






INTRODUCTION

The Calicut University requires the students of Masters in Social Work (MSW) to have a Rural Exposure Camp for minimum of 5 days as a part of their curriculum. This is meant to give an exposure to the MSW students about the rural realities and make them respond to the needs in the villages. This also gives them an opportunity to start using their professional skills in which they are trained and becomes a field to link theory and practice. The rural camp is designed to evoke a living experience for the students and planned as a stayed program for the entire camping period. The direct experience of the rural living will always bring a change in the attitude of the students when the philosophical and theoretical perspectives of social work profession are explained during the guidance and supervision sessions.

The program is decided in such a way that it gives participate, reflective and analytical learning for the social work trainees, the camp activities included home visits study about the rural community, manual work and cultural program. The rural camp experience is one of the key factors in equipping students towards their goal of becoming professionals. With this intention the university has placed rural camp as an important requirement in the curriculum. As per the mandatory requirement, the students of the Department of Social Work, Christ college autonomous irinjalakuda conducted the rural camp at Nelliyampathy from 20/08/22 to 23/08/22 It helped the students to make the curriculum more skill based, practical & also gave an exposure to rural life style on the basis of education, health and occupation, social & political status of the village.

The name given for the camp was PRAVEGA -2022

The duration of the camp was 4 days. It aims at helping the students to understand the rural community and its problems. The camp provides an opportunity to work with the people in creative and constructive way, in order to upgrade their social relationship with a rural perspective.

- Understanding a community in terms of its geographical, social, economic and political system, power structure and their inter relationships based on the theoretical understanding obtained from the courses in the semester.
- Understanding the values and code of ethics of professional social work practice and familiarize with the principle of social work.
- Understand and emphasize with the living conditions and the problems of the rural communities.
- Understand and appreciate the culture, norms, and values of the community varied section of the society.
- Develop understanding of the assumption's principles, phases, and models of community organization.
- Demonstrate professional rapport building skills with the people in the community.
- Demonstrate skills in the social analysis and need assessment, program planning, implementation, and evaluation framework in a community setting.
- PRA to develop and incorporate the knowledge and opinions of rural people in the planning and management of services.

AREA PROFILE OF THE CAMP

Nelliyampathy is a hill station within the Nelliyampathy Forest Reserve, in the

southwest Indian state of Kerala. The road to it, which goes through the dense

forests of the Western Ghats, is known for its many hairpins turns. To the west

is Kesavan Para, a vantage point with views of nearby tea plantations. Farther

west is the 19th-century Pothundi Dam. Northeast is the Seetharkundu

Viewpoint, with waterfalls nearby.

Nelliyampathy is better known as Poor Man's Ooty, due to its unexplored virgin

hill station status, famed for its large bio-farms, plantations and orange gardens.

The hills are part of highly sensitive Western Ghats and was once thick dense

teak forests inhabited by tribals.

BUDGETING

for 22 students and 2 faculty members. The budget formulated for the camp is given below.

Rural camp amount

Camp fee - 3000 per student. Travel fee - 966 per student.

Total amount of camp fee - 66000/-

Travel fee - 21260/- (1260 \$ for toll)

Total = 66000 + 21260 = 87,260/

ON CAMP ACTIVITIES

Based on the objectives the following activities were carried out during 4 days of the rural camp;

DAY 1

Everyone reached the college on 20th August 2022 at 9 am as scheduled A small meeting was conducted with ms rosemary t George HOD and faculties in charge of Pravega before leaving.

Left college at 9:45 am. Reached nemmara Town at 12 pm and Visited Pothundi Dam nemmara . The food was at 2 pm arranged in forest office nemmara .

After that the inauguration session and a small icebreaking session conducted under mr. Satheesh.

After the inauguration and ice breaking & gaming sessions which was conducted on the basis of groups divided. Divided the students into 3 groups. Reached polachirakkal school at 6:15 pm.

The cleaning activities was done by the students. After the refreshments an orientation class was conducted for students about nelliyampathy and CLSL And most importantly on rural camp schedule

. Orientation class was led by Mr Ashok nemmara (DIRECTOR, CLSL), in that session divided the students in groups for the Activites for the coming days. Dinner was served at 9:30pm under the food committee. after dinner Divided the students for next day committees. And selected the students to perform street play. The street play practice was extended to 12 am. After finishing the practice everyone has gone to sleep.

DAY 2

YOGA SECTION

The second day of the camp started with yoga. It was conducted from 6.00 to 7.30 a.m which was handled by Mr. Anilkumar, (CLSL, member) and social work trainee Ms.Dona Tenson. And trainees practiced various types of Asanas during the section.

• STREET PLAY PRACTICE SECTION

After yoga, street play practice was conducted under the leadership of social work trainees Mr. AbhiShankar, Ms.Jismi John and Ms. Aiswarya Reghunath from 7.30 p.m-8:30 p.m. The street play was on the topic Childrens rights and Mobile addiction. All the trainees were actively participated in the practice section.

SESSION 2: - PARTICIPATORY RURAL APPRISAL

The second session was handled by Mr. Ashok Kumar, Director of Center for Life Skill Learning. The session was welcomed by Ms. Sona Sajan, social work trainee. The class was on the topic "What is PRA and how is it to be used in the community?" He also detailed about the various PRA tools such as Transcent walk, resources map, social

map, historical time line, seasonal calendar, Janam Vanam, problem of the society etc. and how to use these in the community. This session lasted for one hour from 10:00 am to 11.00 am.

PADI VISIT

After that at 11.30 the social work trainees were divided into two groups and went to two Padi to take PRA. The trainee visited Koonam Palma and pothumpara padi and understood the lifestyle of the people there and the problems they faced and observed observed their resources. Here trainees applied the PRA tools Social Map, Resource Map, Transcend Walk, Historical Timeline Seasonal Calendar and Janam Vanam. After all this, the trainees came back at 2 o'clock.

SESSION: 3 LISTENING

The 3 rd session was handled by Mr. Satheesh on the topic 'Listening'. That was very vibrant session and he managed the trainees very well. The main topics covered in the class were Intellectual listening, Selective listening, Prejudiced listening, Emotional listening etc. And after the session the resource person also conducted a dance competition and other games in the divided 4 Groups as a group activity and to make us more energized. The session ended at 4.30. Pm.

Tribal colony visit

After that we went to visit Pulianpara tribal colony at 5.30 pm. Interacted with the people and talked about their lifestyles and the challenges they face. Interacted with the head of the tribal community who is in the thirtieth position of that colony and asked and understood what changes he wishes to see in the colony. Trainees returned from there at 6.45 pm.

Evaluation

After the colony visit and dinner trainees were sitting together for the evaluation section. Mr. Asokan Nenmara, both the faculties and the trainees given their feedback on the day. And after that they have given some duties to be done and discussed the next day programme schedule

PRA CONCLUSION

About Koonampaalam village

Koonampalam village is an electoral ward in nelliyampathy gramapanchayth. As a part of applying PRA tool, our group visited the koonampalam village. The objective was to interact with the village people, to learn about their life style and to gain information about the village. Most of the village people are mostly the employees of AVT tea estate workers. They are paid 420 rupees per day. Those people who are the employees of AVT estate lives in the quarters provided by company. Village people are very friendly and cooperative. They were open about their problems and life situations and shared their experiences. It was an unforgettable experience to interact with the people and explore the village.

Through PRA tools such as transact walk, resource map, social map, historical timeline, seasonal calender can help to understand their living condition and collect various information about the village.

About pothupaara

Trainees visited pothupaara to study and analyze the resources in paadis through PRA tools. The paadis are provided by AVF Tea company in which most of the rural people work.most of the paadis are built by British and it has a long history of about 100 years .

Trainees applied PRA tools such as transects walk, Resource map, social map, historical timeline, seasonal calendar, Janam vanam with respect to the Area.

About puliyanpara tribal colony

After visiting koonampalam village, trainees got oppurtunity to visit a tribal colony named pulianpara. It's a tribal area where people live together and shared a common life style. Group visited 4 families and tried to apply PRI there also. It was the first experience of the group menmbers to visit and gain knowledge regarding

a tribal colony. The tribals in pulianpara includes malaya caste and their lifestyle is different from the urban people. Recently only 3 families got electicity connection

Conclusion of PRA

In order to make the students experience group living and to initiate and participate in developmental works in nellyampathy and to know the village people very PRA studies was conducted. It paved the way for building confidence, problem solving, stimulated sense of adventure, encouraged social interaction. It provided a chance a chance to rewind and think about us from luxury life to middle life. For every trainee through the application of PRA tools, they identified resources and history of village.

OBSERVATIONS

- 1. Trainee observed that their life is insecure
- 2. Trainee observed that almost all village people are suffering from economic issues. 3.Most of them are living in low standard of life.
- 4.Most of them doesn't have a little piece of land by their own. 5.Tea is the main plantation at there
- 6. They all suffer from difficulties in transport facilities 7. They all suffer sudden attack from wild animals.
- 8. They have no efficient hospital
- 9. Most of the children stop their studies after higher secondary

DAY 3

The third day of the camp, 22/08/22 started with yoga by Mr.Anil kumar. The yoga started by 6.00 am and lasted for one and quarter hours. Then the social work trainees shifted from Polachirakkal Higher Secondary School to Hill top residency, followed by food.

HOME VISIT AND CLEANING AT POTHUMALA

Social work trainees left Nelliyampathi in 11.10 am to go to Pothumala, where they helped an elderly mentally retarded woman, Shanthamma. Social work trainees reached the home at 12.32 pm. Trainees were divided into groups and one group cleaned the house of Shanthamma which was in bad condition, while the other group cleared the off road to Pothumala by filling the pits with stones and pebbles. Trainee spend around four hours interacting with Shanthamma and cleaning.

The trainees reached back at the residency at 5.30 pm.By 6.00 to 7.00 trainees prepared the report of first and second day. The next session was conducted by Ms. Anitha, secretary of CLSL and counsellor of Palakkad Medical College. She explained about counselling and the risk factors associated with it. The session was an interactive one and all the trainees participated with full heart.

It was followed by food and campfire. The campfire started at around 9.45 pm, where the director of CLSL Mr.Asokan Nenmara,Mr.Anil Kumar,Mr.Saijith N S,Ms.Anitha and Ms.Meghana Davis participated. It was a campfire and evaluation session which all of the trainees enjoyed and concluded at 11.00 pm.

DAY 4

Yoga session:

On 23/08/2022, yoga session was conducted for trainees from 6.45am to 7.30am under the guidance of Mr. P R Anilkumar. Mr. Saijith N S and Mrs. Meghana Davis had given the instruction about the report and newspaper presentation.

• Newspaper presentation:

The trainees prepared for the newspaper presentation and submission of the daily report. Presentation of those pending newspaper was completed at 10.30am to11.00am infront of Mr. Saijith N S and Mrs. Meghana Davis and the whole CLSL team. Trainees were divided into 4 teams at the 1st day of the camp. One team had already presented their newspaper and the remaining 3 teams presented at the given time.

Awareness classes:

Trainees were divided into 10 groups which include 2-3 members each and then conducted an awareness classes for 5-10 classes of Polachirakal Higher Secondary School on different topics such as drug addiction, life skills, social media addiction etc.. at 11.20am to 12.15pm. Ms. Ashly Shajan welcomed the Mrs. Shetty, the HM of the school and H M introduced the school to the trainees and after taking classes Mr. Nair Arjun Ravinderan thanked the HM for providing the opportunity.

Inauguration of closing ceremony:

The inauguration of closing ceremony was conducted at the Forest office station Nelliyampathy by the forest ranger Mr.Vaishak, Army officer from 1.15pm to 1.45pm. Ms. Anamika Chandran welcomed the officer.


ONE DAY CAMP

The program was a remarkable one.



INAUGURATION



- The Adivasis in Attapadi has become a shattered community.
- Adivasi have become a minority in Attapadi and are living amidst of the settlers' contractors and politicians.

- The social work trainees got an idea about how the Local Self Governments and Panchayati Raj Institutions work.
