15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The National Education Policy, NEP 2020, visualizes the integral growth of students through a multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary manner by bridging the diverse fields of Science, Technology, Humanities, Language studies, Commerce, Environmental Studies etc. All departments and Boards of Studies of the college prepared syllabi for Multidisciplinary courses and Minor courses for the students of other departments as envisioned by NEP 2020. Under Choice Based Credit Semester System, all UG students are offered an Open Course from an entirely different programme to extend their multidisciplinary exposure. For the promotion of multidisciplinary research, seed money proposals are invited for multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary projects. It has been also decided to establish a chair on Indian Knowledge System aiming to promote multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary research.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Academic Bank of Credits has been envisaged to facilitate the academic mobility of students with the freedom to study in the Higher Education Institutions across the country with an appropriate "credit transfer" from one programme to another and from one college to another. As per the UGC Regulations, 2021 F. No. 14-31/2018 (CPP-II) the ABC Project has been implemented successfully within the college. The Academic id was created for students from 2021 admission. The student id is created in the Digital Locker system of the NAD ensuring easy access, authenticity and safe storage. The college has efficiently implemented the above said regulation. Using the college erp system each student's academic details are easily linked to the ABC id.

17. Skill development:

Christ College, located in a semi-urban background, has tried to incorporate skill-based learning into curriculum, especially by focusing on the agrarian background in which the College is situated. The College has developed an Agro park in the Campus which will be of huge benefit to the local community. This has also a training aspect where students are given formal introduction to the Science of Agriculture and Veterinary Science. The Paper Recycling Unit established in the College, apart from being an environmental initiative, also provides parttime employment to students as a part of 'Earn while Learn' Project. The College also has an Innovation Room for conducting ample research and exhibiting the findings. The College has an active ED club to promote entrepreneurship among the students. Many more value-added certificate programmes are available

to students. Many have direct skill development objectives like: Horticulture, Water Quality Analysis and Analytical Techniques (Botany), Data Analysis Using Excel, Financial Planning, Cryptocurrency, Fundamentals of Capital Markets (Commerce), Basics of Translation, English For Placement and Professional Success, Content Creation Using AI and ChatGPT, Harnessing AI in Literary Research, English Proficiency (English), Office Automation (Hotel Management), Microsoft Office Specialist- Excel Associate (Computer Science), Basics of Microsoft Excel, Dynamic Mathematics Using GeoGebra, Vedic Mathematics and Its Applications (Mathematics), Introduction to Latex (Statistics), Scientific Waste Management, Environmental Analysis and Analytical Techniques (Environmental Science), Basics Electric and Electronic Equipment Maintenance Course, Basics of Biomedical Physics, Electromagnetic Metamaterials and Their Applications, Solar Photovoltaic Technology Basics (Physics), Nutrition and Health (Food Technology), Football Coaching and Management, Health and Fitness Management, Fundamental of Research in Physical Education, Chess Fundamentals: A Gateway to Mastery (Physical Education), Food Chemistry & Quality Assurance, Cosmetics and Sanitary Formulations: Production, Quality Control and Marketing (Chemistry), Skill Training for Development Communication (Social Work), Web Designing Html & .Net (Vocational Studies), Multilingual Typing Course (Malayalam), Karate Training Program (Hindi).

18. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Christ College, located in a semi-urban background, has always placed high value in integrating Indian knowledge systems in education. The college is located in Thrissur District which is the cultural capital of Kerala, exactly at Irinjalakuda, known for its cultural hegemony in terms of temple arts like Kathakali, Koodiyattam etc. The college completed all requirements for the establishment of Sangam Grama Madhava Chair for the coordination of activities on Indian Knowledge System. Various departments of the college forwarded proposals for funded research projects in collaboration with the Department of Sanskrit on Indian Knowledge System and for the promotion of regional languages. The College has an Oral History Archive stored in the D-space Repository by the Dept of History. It has a rare collection of indigenous Knowledge in Agriculture which includes early agricultural practices in Kannur district and anecdotes by women farmers, knowledge systems like medieval, practical knowledge on Blacksmith Technology, Indigenous knowledge in Treatment (Ayurveda), Oil Processing etc. College library has a Jnana Udyan (Garden Library) to inculcate the spirit

of Gurukula Education and Ecofriendly learning. The College regularly celebrates important days related to National integration and cultural significance.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

In line with the spirit of NEP, Christ College already implemented OBE from the academic year 2019. The steps the college has taken in this regard are the following- PEO, PO, PSO and CO which are in line with global standards with local and regional relevance are clearly stated and are given to all important stakeholders. Initially the college utilized the software deQ developed by IPSR for the effective mapping process and the calculation of CO-PO attainment. The OBE team under the supervision of the Office of the Controller of Examinations in collaboration with IQAC is formulating the OBE strategies of the college. From the Academic year 2023-24, the OBE team modified the college ERP system for the CO-PO mapping and for the calculation of OBE attainment. The OBE team of the college is equipped to provide OBE consultancy for the higher education institutions.

20.Distance education/online education:

In 2016, the IQAC of the College formed an ICT team to promote online education and to integrate it with the conventional teaching-learning process. All students and teachers are enrolled in Moodle LMS. The college is equipped to conduct the mandatory internal assessments like Assignments, Test Papers etc. utilizing the Moodle LMS. Coaching for competitive exams like JAM, NET etc are given through Moodle LMS. The College ICT team is equipped to provide training on Moodle and other online learning resources for neighboring educational institutions. Christ College configured its own opencourseware portal- Christ OpenCourseWare (<https://www.christopencourseware.com/>) and programmes having all the four quadrants of MOOC education specified by UGC. Foundation courses introduced as a part of Bridge course training are provided in the above portal. A number of value-added courses are also available in the online mode. The College has made use of online platforms to connect to its Alumni base and have conducted a series of webinars whereby our present students are given a chance to interact with expert Alumni members. College has now two dedicated Youtube channels for education with more than 700 high quality video lectures www.youtube.com/Christopencourseware www.youtube.com/Christopencoursewarebeta

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

Gender

133 courses in the college curriculum are pertinent to Gender. The Women's Development Cell held various talks and training programmes in furtherance of gender diversity and inclusion. The female sports team bagged Second Best College Award in the Calicut University inter-collegiate competition.

Environment and Sustainability

234 courses in the curriculum twine the terrain of Environment and Sustainability. The Department of Botany celebrated World Environment Day to great pomp and reflection. The department in accord with Biodiversity Club nipped several unsought alien invasive plants on the campus. The NSS Unit's activities commensurate with Swachh Bharat Abhiyan was laudable. The "Green" campus of Christ is a vibrant web of scintillating flora and fauna.

Human Values

153 courses in the curriculum serve to bolster Universal Human Values. Besides these, Value Education Classes are made obligatory. "Savishkara", the pride and praxis of Thavanish Club, fostered the competencies of differently-abled students making social cohesion second nature to Christ.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

The college employs efficient methods to evaluate the learning levels of students to categorize them as slow, medium, or advanced learners and organize tailored programmes accordingly.

Freshers are introduced to this, along with the college curriculum, activities, opportunities, and available facilities, during the post-admission Student Induction Programme. Marks from entry-level tests and qualifying examinations are utilized to classify students as slow, advanced and medium learners.

The assessment of student learning levels is conducted through both direct and indirect methods. The direct method includes a screening test encompassing English, core subjects, quantitative aptitudes and a psychometric evaluation while the indirect method includes interactive sessions during the Student Induction Programme (Dheeksharambh). During the induction, the Head of Department and Chief Mentor interact individually with students. This interaction allows the Chief Mentor to understand students' prior academic achievements, learning levels, and family backgrounds. Peer learning groups are formed within the class, each consisting of a balanced mix of slow, medium and advanced learners, with a mentor assigned to coordinate activities tailored to address the specific learning needs of the group.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

The teaching-learning process is a dynamic interaction between educators and learners aimed at facilitating knowledge acquisition and skill development. Effective teaching engages students actively, encouraging critical thinking and problem-solving while fostering a supportive learning environment. Ultimately, the process is not just about imparting information, but also about inspiring curiosity, promoting lifelong learning, and equipping students with the tools necessary to navigate an ever-changing world. The teaching methods in Christ College are adopted with the vision to cater the diverse sections of learners. To improve learning experiences, we use student-centred teaching and learning strategies include problem-solving methodologies, experiential learning, and participatory learning. All the science programmes and many of the social science programmes integrate practical courses with adequate experiential practice for the students. They also provide platform for participative learning to the students. Moreover, projects, fieldworks, industrial visits, seminars, workshops, hands-on training etc. inculcate among the students the practice and habit of participative learning and problem-solving methodologies. Every postgraduate and undergraduate program has a required project or dissertation course that gives students ample chance to incorporate and practice problem-solving techniques.

2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT-enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning

Christ College incorporates advanced technologies into its educational framework to improve the learning experience. Essential ICT tools include Intelligent Interactive Panels featuring smart boards, Intel PCs, WiFi connectivity, and specialized software tailored to various subjects. A specialized video lab, equipped with HD cameras, a teleprompter, a Chroma screen, and additional accessories, supports the production of video tutorials, while an audio lab is dedicated to creating audiobooks for students with

visual impairments. Furthermore, three recording studios are utilized for live lectures and webinars, and ICT-enabled classrooms, furnished with interactive panels, cameras, and projectors. Digital E-repository (Dspace) , Moodle Learning Management System (LMS) for centralized content distribution significantly enhance the teaching process. Additionally, Christ College maintains LMS integrated ERP system for recording and maintain academic information. Also the college maintains and contains an open course ware to disseminate educational contents.

In the academic year 2023-24, the college introduced Christ Meet, a tailored audio-video conferencing platform, and established a partnership with Pearson MePro to enhance English language skills. Undergraduate classrooms were outfitted with Intelligent Interactive Panels and speakers, while postgraduate classrooms received upgraded computer systems to promote engagement and research. These initiatives contribute to a vibrant and inclusive learning environment, accommodating various learning styles and promoting educational excellence.

The IQAC collaborates with the Controller of Examinations, typically in April, to draft a detailed Academic Calendar for the academic

year. This document establishes a schedule for internal and end semester examinations for odd and even semesters while accounting for adequate teaching days. The timing of internal assessments is planned strategically to ensure sufficient syllabus coverage.

The draft of academic calendar undergoes a comprehensive review process, including discussions in Heads of Department meetings. Upon final approval by the Academic Council and Governing Council, the calendar is disseminated through the College handbook, College website and College notice board.

The implementation of the Academic Calendar is overseen by the Vice-Principals, Deans, and the Controller of Examinations. Any necessary adjustments are discussed and resolved during College Council meetings. The Academic Calendar and examination schedules are incorporated into the Teachers' Diary to assist faculty members. This resource serves as a vital tool for planning teaching schedules and maintaining daily activity records. Such meticulous planning and adherence contribute to the smooth and efficient management of academic activities within the institution.

Additionally, the College utilizes QnSMART software from IPSR Solutions, a cutting-edge Outcome-Based Education (OBE)-enabled question paper generator, for creating high-quality question papers.

Internal assessments—including test papers, attendance, seminars, and assignments—are conducted digitally via the Linways platform. This seamless integration of technology reflects the College's commitment to fostering an efficient, modern, and student-centered educational ecosystem.

The lecturers introduce the material to the students over the course of a few hours. The departments have hard copies of the Learning Outcomes and syllabus for students' quick access. Tutorial meetings have been used to convey to students the significance of the learning objectives. Once an agreement has been reached, the information is extensively disseminated and advertised via a variety of channels, including the display and/or communication listed above under the website, classrooms, department notice boards, laboratories, meetings (interactions with students), parent meetings, and the college library. The institution adopts a structured and balanced approach to evaluate the attainment of Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs). Course outcome assessment is determined by a blend of internal (20%) and external (80%) evaluations. Eight key parameters guide this process, with five compulsory components: one internal exam, individual assignments, attendance, and the end-semester university exam. The remaining three - group assignments, seminars, and comprehensive viva - are optional, allowing for flexibility and deeper engagement.

Programme Outcome (PO) and Programme Specific Outcome (PSO) attainment is directly measured using a CO to PO/PSO matrix, ensuring clear alignment between course-level achievements and broader academic goals. Indirect methods, such as graduate exit surveys and employer or higher education feedback, enrich this evaluation. The overall attainment formula allocates 80% to direct assessment and 20% to indirect feedback, providing a comprehensive perspective on student learning and program effectiveness.

This comprehensive assessment framework drives academic excellence; ensuring students achieve course-specific objectives while aligning with broader program goals, ultimately enhancing their preparedness for future professional and academic endeavours.

The college's commitment is embodied in its accessible Research Promotion Policy and the establishment of the Christ College Research and Consultancy Promotion Council (CCRCPC), which streamlines research initiatives. Financial support is provided through the Christ College Research Seed Fund (CCRSF) and the Christ College Research Fellowship (CCRF), targeting faculty-led projects, advanced instrumentation, and scholars without external funding. Under the banner of the multidisciplinary forum Scholars Connect, the college organizes a monthly popular lecture series and annual multidisciplinary research conferences, all institutionally funded. The lecture series has showcased ten stimulating talks, averaging 50 participants, on topics ranging from ecosystem health to Ayurvedic therapies, while on national conference brought together diverse disciplines through keynote sessions, research presentations, and expos. The college recognizes exceptional research outputs by displaying notable papers in its library, fostering academic inspiration. With 126 active research scholars mentored by expert supervisors, Christ College sustains a vibrant research ecosystem that blends innovation, mentorship, and robust resources,

reinforcing its status as a beacon of academic excellence.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES**4.1 - Physical Facilities**

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc.

The institution possesses adequate infrastructure and physical amenities to facilitate effective teaching and learning. This includes classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, and more.

- The total constructed area of the college spans 37,185.57 square meters.
- For undergraduate programs, there are 93 spacious classrooms with ample lighting, electric fans, speakers and 90 of them are equipped with LCD projectors and 3 are having Intelligent Interactive Panels. Additionally, the college boasts 32 postgraduate classrooms featuring Intelligent Interactive Panels.

- All classrooms are wifi-enabled with a high-speed internet connection of 250 mbps. The postgraduate classrooms are furnished with Jefferson chairs and appropriate furniture.
- Each classroom is equipped with essential teaching tools.
- The college has established six excellent facilities for recording and live streaming online classes, incorporating video conferencing capabilities, webcams, speakers, and wifi in these live classrooms.
- Furthermore, the college hosts 34 well-equipped laboratories, including those for undergraduate, postgraduate, and research purposes, each adhering to standard safety measures and effluent management protocols.
- Among them are a Water Testing Lab, Zoology Museum, Geology Museum, Incubation Room, and a Common Instrumentation Lab.
- There are 18 computer labs, all equipped with full power backup and protected by a Firewall.
- The college features an Audio-Visual Centre with mixing and editing facilities. Among the four seminar halls, two are centrally air-conditioned.

- The auditorium, with a seating capacity of 600 chairs, features a robust sound system equipped with an amplifier (Behringer, 500W) and six speakers (100W {2 nos.} & 200W {4 nos.}), complemented by effective lighting and electric fans.
- The Chavara seminar hall, established in 2000 and accommodating 150 chairs, is equipped with mike amplifiers and speakers, available for student use.
- The open hall in the students' corner (New block), established in 2016, serves as a venue for cultural activities in the evening.
- The institution also boasts a 400m athletics standard track with gallery seating for 15,000, established in 1974 across an area of 20,832 square meters.
- The stadium pavilion, established in 2018, covers an area of 790 square meters.
- There is a basketball court (4) made of concrete and mud,

established in 1999 and 2020, spanning an area of 2,951 square meters.

- The football field, with a gallery seating capacity of 3,000, was established in 2012, 2014, and 1957 across an area of 8,470 square meters.
- Additionally, there are four volleyball courts established in 1956 and 2020, covering an area of 2,414 square meters, and a netball court established in 2018 with an area of 1,092 square meters.

Sustainable management of waste is essential in reducing the environmental impact and providing a safe and healthy work environment for teaching and nonteaching employees, students and visitors. The waste management policy of the college is instrumental in reducing the detrimental impact on the environment, preventing pollution, enhancing environmental consciousness, taking mitigation measures, and undertaking methods for sustainable growth.

- Biogas plant (Capacity 25 m³) installed in the Hostel premises.
- The vermicomposting unit (Capacity 6 tonnes in 45 days) installed near the College Garden converts the dried leaves from the garden and waste from college canteen to vermicompost.
- The college has an agreement with Irinjalakuda Municipality to deal with non-biodegradable waste. The student clubs Bhoomithrasena and Enviro club spearheads the awareness as

well as the management of such activities.

- College has installed incinerators for the disposal of sanitary napkins in the Girls toilets.
- College has also signed MoU with Progressive - E recycling and trading company, Thrissur for the scientific disposal of E-waste.
- The paper recycling unit (Capacity 50 kg per day) converts the paper waste to packing materials.
- 'PEN DRIVE'- The NSS units of college has initiated the pen drive in which the plastic body of the pens are collected and reused.
